Health systems in Canada and in OCDE countries have faced waves of reforms often with results below expectations. The notion of systemness provides an alternate perspective to think about "real-reforms" in healthcare. Attention is paid to vertical and horizontal interdependencies within health systems and to political, organizational and clinical factors that drive transformation and improvement. Levers to transcend structural and political limitations within health systems will be discussed. Examples of reformative strategies adopted by public or tax-based health systems will serve to illustrate potential and challenges in achieving systemness.

9:00 Making integration work For complex patients

G. Ross Baker, Ph.D., Professor and Program Lead, Quality Improvement and Patient Safety Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation, University of Toronto

Policy makers in many jurisdictions have recognized that complex, high use and high need patients consume a disproportionately large segment of health care costs. Redesigning care delivery to address the needs of these patients, reduce healthcare expenditures and improve patients' experiences has become a new "holy grail," motivating policy makers and leaders in launching many health system reforms. Integrating care across the continuum has been a major aim of these reforms, but effective integration has been elusive in many contexts. Focusing on structural reform, payment mechanisms and elegant diagrams of the patient journey are necessary but insufficient to change the microenvironment of care. Careful review of existing evidence and successful models suggests that 3 key elements are needed to integrate care delivery at the front line: (1) New or redesigned roles and mechanisms that help to coordinate patients' journey across health and social care systems; (2) greater connection between traditional healthcare and community based services; and, (3) focused efforts to change how clinical teams engage with other providers to address the needs of their patients.

9:30 Systemness: Perspectives from two large Federal Health Systems and Observations from the Commercial Sector
